

Theodora & The Logan Mansion:

Built in 1897 by beer & ice manufacturer Lafayette R. Logan,

The Logan Mansion is one of the finest remaining Queen Anne Victorian houses in the city. During the 1950's, the mansion became a boarding home for teachers.

Also during this period, an 11 year old girl, Theodora, a neighborhood child, fell to her death from one of the attic windows. Theodora's death has been confirmed by local historian, Eric Brock, through a local newspaper clipping dated May 1904. The paper lists the child's death as a suicide. Hence, Theodora appears to be a predominant figure in the household till this day.

Proprietor Vicki LeBrun reports that here have been sightings from the Florentine, onetime glamorous dinner/nightclub directly across the street when the mansion was uninhabited. From across the street, human figures were witnessed moving in the upstairs windows.

Last year, Vicki informed a couple in route that she might be running errands and if they didn't see her car and to wait outside. The husband announced to his wife after arrival that Vicki was there upon seeing human figures walking in front of the upstairs windows-again, the same room that was Theodora's playroom.

Painters recently working on the house asked Vicki if she had ghosts. They reported that their paint can lids were continuously being rearranged.

Vicki believes that Theodora is a precocious child who plays games. She has moved her address book out of the book's drawer during holiday seasons only to return it a few days later to the same drawer.

Theodora is also likely to lock the screen door on the bottom floor when Vicki ventures outside, forcing her to return through the back door. She's also been known to move an assistant's cell phone from cabinet to cabinet throughout the home. As Vicki states, 'Theodora takes things.'

Strange Brew: The Ultimate Beer Pub

Featuring 120+ Beers including 90+ from all over the world. This is an impressive suite of hops not found anywhere else north of I-10. First Impressions Are Lasting... Chimay, Aiko, Skull Splitter and Delirium Tremens...definitely not a themed bar.

I will say that I hit a lot of bars/clubs every month but it takes a real niche to fill the slot sometimes. There's something about Strange Brew that I really like for various reasons.

First off, when I entered, my eyes immediately caught the glass beer cases brightly illuminated and lined in a neat row cast into the wall under the neon. The wood bar itself seemed especially polished in a vintage sort of way. I also couldn't help but notice that Strange Brew didn't smell like smoke. It smelled like a non-smoking bar in Louisiana-don't know if those actually exist or not.

Out of the mix, I met the high school philosophy professor with his entourage checking out all the IPA brews, the long hair writer, the 20-something with 6 piercings in his face and the 30-ish crowd that flowed through the front door.

With very comfortable seating for 100 people, you can always locate a secluded spot for two or more where there's never any loud, blaring music that forces you to scream in order to communicate. You still hear the tunes but you've got a chance to actually relax and unwind.

Wednesdays seem to be a good mix of all people coming into bar for \$1 drinks; that includes domestic beers, wine, mixed drinks and shots...all for a buck.

A padded menu rests at the bar showcasing 100+ beers in minute detail such as country brewed in, alcohol content and color, i.e., amber, black, golden or dark brown.

I tried the Aiko from Lithuania with an alcohol content of 9.5%. Yum. Tasty. Goodbye Bud Light Lime! Hello Strange Brew.





ITK: Where did you go to school?

Sizer: I went to Savannah School of Art & Design and Centenary College.

ITK: So it's safe to say that you have always been very artistic?

Sizer: Always! Hell, I was tattooing you guys at military school!

ITK: When did you start painting?

Sizer: Centenary. My roommates were all artists and it was a very artistic house. It was there that I did my first art show.

ITK: When did you feel that you wanted to enter the art of tattooing?

Sizer: Senior in college. I was working a crappy job. I had been drawing and painting and a buddy of mine saw a help wanted sign at a tattoo shop. I went and showed them my art and they gave me a chance. They called it an apprenticeship, but I call it self-taught. But hey, they gave me a chance.

ITK: Was it difficult to make the transition from canvas to living flesh?

Sizer: Extremely difficult! Your canvas is alive. It's moving and breathing. I mean people can move, cough, or sneeze. Tattooing is its own medium with its own challenges.

ITK: What is a custom tattoo shop?

Sizer: Custom means that we draw up the piece using our artistic ability. We are the kind of shop one comes to for something that no one else has. We like to one of a kind tattoos.




The Mighty Haag Show



The Longleaf Trail winds along a ridge top through the unique Kisatchie Hills and features outstanding views of rocky outcrops, distant hills and buttes frame Kisatchie Bayou's sparkling water and white sand beaches. Elevation ranges from 80 feet in the creek bottoms to 400 feet in the

hills. From Shreveport, take I-49 south and exit at Natchitoches. Turn right and travel approximately 4.2 miles to Hwy. 117. Turn left and continue approximately 41.3 miles to Kisatchie National Forest on left.

Transylvania is located in East Carroll Parish.

Mitcham's Farms-Ruston

The largest peach orchard in Louisiana with over 12,000 trees nestled among the rolling hills of Ruston. From I-20, take exit 84 (Cooktown Rd.) and head north. Turn left on Kentucky Ave. Turn right on Mitcham Orchard Rd. The Peach store will be on the left. 318-255-3409

Mt. Lebanon, Louisiana

This area was probably the first permanent settlement in what is now Bienville Parish. Mt. Lebanon Baptist Church was organized in 1837 and is still in use today. Eight houses in town are listed on the National Register of Historic Places including the original stagecoach stop and hotel. From Shreveport, take I-20 east. Take exit 61 for LA-154 toward Athena/Gibsland. Turn right at LA-154 south. Turn left at Par Rd. 250/Stagecoach Trail. Travel time from Downtown approximately 40 minutes.

Natchitoches National Fish Hatchery

Established in 1931, this warm water facility features 16 aquarium tanks filled with native species including catfish, redear sunfish, largemouth bass, and bluegill that are raised for local public waters and farm ponds. A 25-minute video presentation and group tours are available. 615 Highway 1 South • Natchitoches, LA 71457 318-352-5324

Republic of Texas Boundary Marker

Set April 23, 1841. In the early 1700's, both France and Spain claimed the area in what is now Texas. This marker established the boundary between Texas and Louisiana. French explorers claimed all land drained by the Mississippi River and its tributaries as Louisiana. Located on the Louisiana/ Texas state line on LA Hwy. 765 and Texas FM-31. This is about 6 miles from Logansport, La. 100 yards or so from the marker is a sign that reads "Galloway". This was the birthplace of country musician Jim Reeves.

The Port of Shreveport-Bossier

Located at the head of navigation for the Red River encompassing more than 2000 acres. Approximately 4 miles south of the Shreveport city limits. 318-524-2272

The Ralph A. Worley Observatory

Free public star parties are held here. The dome contains a 16inch Newtonian reflector. Located approximately 8 miles south of LSUS. Take Hwy. 1 south and turn onto Hwy. 175. Travel approximately 1.7 miles. Turn onto Astronomical Observatory Rd.

The Three States Marker

Entering Louisiana at its northwest corner, a person can stand in three states at the same time. North of Rodessa, the Three States Marker shows where the borders of Louisiana, Texas and Arkansas all converge.

The first bottler of Coca-Cola, Joseph Biedenharn, lived in Monroe.

Look Out Towers



The tallest lookout tower in **the world** is located in Alexandria, Louisiana. The Woodworth Tower stands 175 feet.

Alexander State Forest, located in central Louisiana, was established in 1923. Though originally intended to be the first of several state owned demonstration forests, today it is the only one.

The multiple-use forest contains 700 acres of bottomland hardwood, 5,000 acres of southern yellow pine and the 2,250 acre Indian Creek Lake and Recreation Area.

Today the land is an excellent example of reforestation and forest management containing about 35 million board feet of timber. Extensive tree planting was undertaken when a Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) camp was located on the forest during 1933 - 1940. During CCC days, the enrollees, mostly World War I veterans, built the log administrative building, which is now listed on the Louisiana - National Register of Historic Places. The 175-foot Woodworth Fire Tower at the headquarters compound is believed to be the tallest fire tower in the

world

From Shreveport, take I-49 South towards Alexandria. Travel for 128 miles. Take exit 73 for LA-3265 toward Woodworth. Turn right at LA-3265 W/Robinson Bridge Road. Turn left at Indian Creek Road. Travel 1.2 miles. Take the 1st left onto Camp Ground Rd./Forest Service Rd. 14. End at Alexander State Forest Camp Ground/Forest Service Road 14.

What the Thrifty Peanut did was partner with around 25 non-profit and for-profit organizations to sell their excess inventory and generate the income that these businesses need to continue operating. In effect, the organizations drop off the surplus and the Thrifty Peanut does all marketing, sales, shipping and tracking. At the end of the month, each organization receives a check for 50% of the profits with the Thrifty Peanut eating the advertising costs. One such local partnership receives a yearly check totaling in the five figure income bracket...that's net income.

The Thrifty Peanut has also recently acquired Betty's Books on Shreveport-Barksdale Hwy. and will maintain the stock that Betty's customers are used to. If you don't find it there, place your request and they'll ship it from the Bossier store for you.

How these two people pull off this monumental feat is beyond me.


In The Know talks to Terry Eldridge with The Grascals The Rowdy Friends Tour with Hank Williams, Jr.

April 9th, Century Tel, 7pm

ITK: Basically, by musical standards, you guys have come a long way in a very short amount of time, haven't you? **Terry:** Yes, we have. We've been very fortunate in that. Usually, a group, it usually takes them about 10 years to get to the stature that we have risen to. But, we've had a lot of help along the way. We've worked very hard at it. But we've also had some help from people in the music industry such as Ms. Dolly Parton. We had the rocket and she gave us the fuel.

ITK: I heard that you guys really didn't think you'd ever really go anywhere, that

you were just looking for a side gig to make some extra money. Is that true?



ITK: Who is The Monkees fan in the group that wanted to record a remake of 'Last Train To Clarksville'? **Terry:** [laughs] We had talked about doing that on the previous album before. And then we were just looking for another song because we like to pick from different genres of songs and I think it was Jamie that said "What about that Monkees song"? We get so much response and people thought "Whoever thought to do that in bluegrass style"?

ITK: Around 2004, Dolly Parton took a keen interest in The Grascals. So keen, that you guys ended up becoming Dolly's opening act and then her stage band performing at Dolly wood. How did that come about? **Terry:** Well, me and Jimmie had worked with her before on an album that she did called 'Halo and Horns'. Our first album was recorded at the same studio that she recorded at. One day Jimmie mentioned some of our

songs and he played her 2 or 3 cuts. She said that she wanted us to be her opening act and also go on tour with her.

ITK: It's all about being at the right place at the right time. Terry: You ain't a kidding!

ITK: I know in 2007 that Mayberry's Finest, a food company, sponsored The Grascals. What has to happen in a bands career to get your own bus with your name on it? **Terry:** A lot of its hard work but it's being at the right place at the right time. We played a trucker's convention here in Louisville and were losing the Mayberry sponsors and Jamie was joking with the lady from Mobile Delvac and told her "Well, you could sponsor us if you want. We'll go down the road with Mobile Delvac painted on the side of the bus." That's how it happened. Now, when we pull into town, everybody knows about Mobile Delvac and all about us cause it's painted on the

ITK: With traditional bluegrass and newgrass as the standard two types of bluegrass, how do you feel about being termed Neo-Traditional Bluegrass musicians? Terry: I feel good about it because we lean more to the traditional but we try to put a new sound to it. I like to call us grass-country because we combine the two types of music. We kind of combine those two together and every now and then we'll throw a rock n roll song in. We'll try it and if it fits our sound, we'll do it.

Dear Smarty Pants:

When I turn the right knob on my bathtub, only cold water comes out. I have no hot water at all regardless of how high I turn the knob. Please help!

Dear Bob:

The first thing you need to do is this: turn off the water and take the faucet completely apart and see if there is any trash in the faucet. For this, you will need a 32X Pulsar Magnification lens with an anti-shock rubber handle, available on special order from Hauser, Inc. Additionally, look back into the faucet fixture in the wall and see if there is anything slowing down the flow of water from there. At that time, get a turkey baster syringe and fill it with Barts homeopathic 32% sterile hydrogen peroxide solution. Shoot the hydrogen peroxide into the wall portion where the faucet rests and determine if you see any white bubbles. If you do, you will immediately know that you have detected the hermeticus verbritaen fungus that has taken over your hot water pressure control release valve.

You will then have to exterminate the fungus BEFORE replacing the faucet back onto the fitting. In order to do this you must determine whether or not it is: A) living and breathing or B) simply breeding.



Time-travelling browsers navigate the web's past

Finding old versions of web pages could become far simpler thanks to a "time-travelling" web browsing technology being pioneered at the Los Alamos National Laboratory in New Mexico.

Bookmarking a page takes you to its current version – but earlier ones are harder to find. One option is to visit a resource like the Internet Archive's Wayback Machine. There, you key in the URL of the site

you want and are confronted with a matrix of years and dates for old pages that have been

cached. Or, if you want to check how a Wikipedia page has evolved, you can hit the "history" tab on a page of interest and scroll through in an attempt to find the version of the page on the day you're interested in.
